Introduction

Immigration has been part of Ottawa's history for centuries. Over the years, the Ottawa community has organized itself in many different ways to welcome, settle and integrate immigrants into the fabric of the Ottawa Community. As such, a large and complex system of services in our community caters to the welcoming, orientation, settlement, and integration of immigrants as they come to our city.

This report aims to create a baseline snapshot of the settlement, language training, and employment support services that are available for immigrants coming to Ottawa, to help them get oriented on how to settle into the community, adapt to local languages, and find jobs. To create this snapshot, our researchers have collected and compiled a large amount of data gathered over the course of 3 months through interviews with Executive Directors and Program Managers of service organizations and through document and internet searches.

As a baseline snapshot, this inventory is intended to be an initial attempt to understand the breadth and depth of settlement, language and employment services in Ottawa. We naturally expect that services will evolve constantly in response to a variety of factors. We therefore make no claim of exhaustively covering all services offered in Ottawa in the areas of settlement, language, and employment. Over the coming years, however, OLIP & WCI will work with local stakeholders to help build on this baseline inventory and update it with subsequent changes.

I. Methodology

1. Research Methods

Research for this inventory and subsequent analysis was conducted in Ottawa during the months of March, April and May 2010. Norah Barongo, an OLIP research consultant, lead the research process with the support of OLIP and WCI staff, and was assisted by a team of volunteer researchers, who kindly helped with the collection and verification of data.

The research methods used for this inventory included semi-structured interviews with Executive Directors and Program Managers of twelve immigrant-serving organizations in Ottawa, combined with thorough reviews of agency and government websites. After the initial data collection, the OLIP team complemented the initial data with additional document searches on specific types of service programs. The following paragraphs outline in detail our approach in each of the research methods we used for the compilation of this inventory.

It is important to note that this inventory is part of a collection of research and consultation activities conducted by OLIP. A Review of Literature provides an overview of the profile of immigrants in Ottawa and their needs, while reports on community consultations and focus groups provide the perspectives of community stakeholders from numerous perspectives: immigrants; settlement service providers; health, education and social service providers; employers and economic integration stakeholders; immigrant associations and ethno-cultural organizations.

1.1 **Interviews**

Semi-structured interviews of approximately 2 hours each were conducted with Executive Directors and senior Program Managers of the twelve key immigrantserving organizations in Ottawa that comprise the Local Agencies Serving Immigrants. The purpose of the interviews was to contribute to a deeper understanding of Ottawa services for immigrants in terms of description and scope of services, and issues affecting eligibility and accessibility, program delivery and the capacity of organizations.

Right before the OLIP-WCI team began the Inventory Project, Citizenship and Immigration Canada introduced new services streams that allow the service providers to combine their service offerings according to five broad outcomes: Orientation, Language Skills, Labour Market Access, Welcoming Communities, and Policy and Program Development – under the Modernized Approach to Settlement Programming. In order to reflect these revisions in the Inventory, the OLIP-WCI team revised the original questionnaire to allow the respondents to describe their services according to the emerging categories of Citizenship and Immigration Canada's modernized approach. While our intention was to make the inventory current, it quickly became clear that this was not practical. At the time of the interviews, many respondents were still adjusting to the new framework and did not yet have sufficient clarity on the implications of the modernized approach for the services they offer. For this reason, the actual analysis of the interview material and additional data is not explicitly categorized according to the modernized approach.

The interviews were conducted by the research consultant and by three volunteer researchers. OLIP provided training sessions for the volunteers to inform them about the purpose of the inventory and about the inventory research process, interview techniques, and the structure of the questionnaire. The volunteers also met individually with the research consultant, Norah Barongo, for more detailed instructions. The volunteers were provided with the research material and transportation allowances to facilitate their participation in the inventory research process.

Due to the limited time and resources that were available for the Inventory Project, the OLIP-WCI team decided to focus the interview part of our research on the 12 members of the Local Agencies Serving Immigrants (LASI) Coalition, listed below:

- 1. Catholic Immigration Centre
- 3. LASI World Skills
- 5. Ottawa Chinese Community Services Centre
- 7. Somali Centre for Family Services
- 9. Conseil Économique et Social d'Ottawa Carleton
- 2. Ottawa Community Immigrant Services Organization
- 4. Jewish Family Services
- 6. Lebanese and Arab Social Service Agency
- 8. Immigrant Women Services Ottawa
- 10. YMCA-YWCA Newcomer Information Centre

11. La Cité Collégiale

12. Ottawa Public Library

These organizations offer all three types of services that the OLIP-WCI inventory covers: Settlement, Language, and Employment Services. In addition, the services of the above organizations focus on services explicitly designed for immigrants. As members of the LASI Coalition, these organizations often coordinate with each other to determine service provision, agency specialization, and when to combine service delivery.

Interview respondents were provided with a detailed guide to the interview, outlining the intention of the interview and the role of the interviewer and respondent. The respondents were also asked to sign a Letter of Informed Consent, which outlined the ethical guidelines of the interview process. This included the assurance that interview responses would remain anonymous in future reporting, including the removal of names and any details that could lead to the identification of interview respondents. In keeping with this practice, volunteer interviewers were instructed to submit all interview notes to the research consultant and to subsequently destroy any hard or electronic copies.

1.2 **Review of Online and Written Material**

In addition to the interviews, a significant amount of data was obtained from an extensive review of agency and government websites and from the Directory of Ottawa-Carleton Community Services (The Blue Book). While the interview part of our research focused on the members of the LASI Coalition, we sought to complement the inventory of the LASI services with the any settlement, language training, and employment services that are offered by other OLIP stakeholders such as the local Community Health and Resource Centres, School Boards, governments, colleges and universities, private businesses, other non-profit organizations. The data obtained from these websites and from the Blue Book were integrated into those collected from the interviews and are presented in the inventory tables of this report (see Appendices A, B and C), under the three broad headings of Settlement, Language and Employment.

Following the completion of the inventory, OLIP staff verified, where necessary, the accuracy of the information obtained from websites by telephoning the appropriate organizations.

1.3 **Analysis**

The analysis of the inventory draws both upon the data collected in interviews and from websites and the Blue Book to identify key strengths and gaps in Settlement, Language and Employment services for immigrants in Ottawa. As indicated above, this inventory is one component of a number of research activities conducted by OLIP, and is therefore also tacitly informed by the findings of these other research initiatives.

1.4 Scope and Limitations of the Service Inventory

The scope of this inventory covers three areas of services: Settlement, Language, and Employment including training, translation, and interpretation, and sociallycentred language supports such as 'conversation circles'. Furthermore, our starting point is on services designed explicitly for immigrants, with some coverage of broadly targeted services in the same three areas.

While the inventory and resulting analysis is quite extensive, it is important to note that is it is by no means intended to be exhaustive. Rather, this document is seen a first step in an evolving process that will continually be built upon to support the implementation of the Ottawa Immigration Strategy. The evolution of this inventory will need to be community-driven, with the intention of filling knowledge gaps that are essential for Ottawa's on-going community planning process to improve immigrant settlement and integration.

This initial snapshot inventory, as presented in this document, is intended to provide the essential groundwork for revisions and further additions by stakeholders of the three sectors covered: Settlement, Language, and Employment. In addition, this inventory may be built upon and expanded to include sectors and services that were beyond the scope of this initial project, but are addressed by the new Ottawa Immigration Strategy: Health and Wellbeing, Education, and Integration Capacity Development.

II. Funding Structures Supporting Ottawa's Landscape of Services for Immigrants

2.1 Government Funding for Settlement, Language, and Employment Services

The framework for all settlement and integration policy in Canada "…explicitly acknowledges the reciprocal obligations of both the host population and newcomers to adapt to take the shifting concerns of a diverse population into account." The federal and provincial governments of Canada provide funding for the majority of settlement services, offered by agencies in the non-profit sector, including ethno-specific organizations. Foundations and private sector funders also partake in providing resources to key services that form part of the complex array of services that are available for immigrants when they come to Ottawa.

At the federal level, key departments supporting integration policy and settlement services are Citizenship and Immigration Canada (CIC), Canadian Heritage and Human Resources and Skills Development Canada (HRSDC). Among these, CIC is the primary department responsible for funding settlement services for immigrants, and has previously funded them through four major categories:

a. Language Instruction for Newcomers to Canada (LINC):

The LINC program involves language training that also contains elements of cultural introduction to Canada.

b. Immigrant Settlement and Adaptation Program (ISAP):

This program is broad, and includes reception, orientation, translation, interpretation, referrals to services, employment assistance, counselling, research, conferences on settlement and integration, and training for settlement workers (Biles, 143).

c. The HOST Program:

The HOST program matches immigrants with individuals or families who are established in Canada for friendship and to help immigrants find their ways in their new community.

d. The refugee adaptation program (RAP):

The RAP includes the private sponsorship program, the Resettlement Assistance Program and the Immigration Loans Program – all designed to support the welcoming and integration of government and privately sponsored refugees.

In 2008-2009, CIC introduced a "modernized approach" to settlement programming. This approach was intended to replace the four program areas with a broad "Settlement Program" with several outcome areas under which programming may fit: Orientation, Language Skills, Labour Market Access, Welcoming Communities, and Policy and Program Development. The Settlement Program includes six streams that service providers may "mix and match" in order to deliver appropriate programming. These streams are: Needs Assessment and Referrals, Information and Awareness Services, Language Learning and Skills Development, Employment-Related Services, Community Connections and Support Services.² This new approach is not yet implemented.

In addition to funding the programs described above, CIC is now also responsible for the Multiculturalism Program, which previously operated under the separate

department of Canadian Heritage. The multiculturalism program focuses on providing funding for programs that recognize and accommodate the diversity of Canadian communities, including linguistic diversities.

Canadian Heritage does not specifically focus on programs for immigrants but focuses on two areas that are of importance for immigrant integration: the official languages program and programs on Canadian identity. The official languages program focuses on strengthening francophone communities in Canada, including promoting the integration of francophone immigrants (Biles, 151).

Human Resources and Skills Development Canada (HRSDC) has a number of programs that are important for immigrant integration, such as finding employment, accessing training and recognition of credentials and experience. More specifically, HRSDC offers three significant programs: the Foreign Credential Recognition Program, the labour program and a program on housing and homelessness. Biles cites the issue of foreign credential recognition as the most commonly mentioned obstacle to labour market participation for newcomers, and one of the most complex barriers (Biles, 154). The Foreign Credential Recognition Program was originally targeted at nurses, doctors and engineers but has since been expanded to other regulated and some non-regulated professions. The labour program includes a responsibility for employment equity while the program on housing and homelessness includes three stages of Government of Canada initiatives on homelessness, all of which include immigrants and refugees as target groups (Biles, 156-157).

Some interdepartmental coordination exists, including a role played by Canadian Heritage in several initiatives under the Foreign Credential Recognition program. There is also collaboration between the government, private sector and community organizations. The housing and homelessness program, for example, includes collaboration with agencies working on homelessness and with the Canadian Mortgage and Housing Corporation (Biles, 157).

The Ontario government also plays a key role in supporting settlement and integration services. Many services for immigrant integration are provincially run, such as housing, education and health services, children and youth services, etc. Population growth and labour market issues are also of great interest to the provincial government. Furthermore, the Ontario Ministry of Citizenship and

Immigration funds a broad range of language and labour market integration services.

Increasingly, municipal governments are assuming important roles in supporting the settlement and integration of immigrants. Biles states that "...due to cutbacks and provincial downloading, municipalities are becoming more central in the delivery of many programs that impact the successful integration of newcomers to Canada" (Biles, 162). In 2002, the Federation of Canadian Municipalities recommended that the federal government increase funding to better recognize the already important municipal role in immigrant integration.

In Ottawa, discussions of immigration and diversity at the municipal level are very recent. In 2007 the City of Ottawa passed a recommendation to establish the "Immigration Ottawa Initiative" to support the development of a community led labour market integration strategy for immigrants. In preparation for this, an inventory of projects either funded or undertaken by the City for immigrant integration was conducted. It found that a large investment across the community was already in existence. Ottawa-specific services will be reviewed in more detail below.

2.2 Selected Providers of Settlement, Language, and Employment Services in Ottawa

Settlement, Language, and Employment services are provided by a broad range of agencies and institutions in Ottawa. These are summarized below:

a. Local Agencies Serving Immigrants

Local Agencies Serving Immigrants (LASI) is a coalition of immigrant service organizations in Ottawa. LASI is made up of twelve distinct organizations, all of which offer a range of services. The coalition was established in 1997 and has since expanded in order to partner, share information, advocate and plan strategically for the future. According to LASI, the vision of the coalition is to:

- "Enhance the social and economic integration of immigrants, refugees and other newcomers:
- Ensure co-operation and collaboration among partner agencies; and
- Influence the community to adapt to newcomers"

The LASI members have recently expanded from 9 to 12 organizations; they are listed below:

- LASI World Skills: Established in 1997 by the LASI coalition, LASI World Skills focuses on facilitating immigrants' access to employment; and offers a range of programs and services that help newcomers, build relationships with employers, and promote partnerships with other agencies.
- Catholic Immigration Centre: The Catholic Immigration Centre has been serving immigrants and refugees in Ottawa for more than 50 years. The centre offers a range of services, specializing in particular on services for refugees and on community connections.
- Immigrant Women Services Ottawa: Founded in 1988 by the LASI Coalition, Immigrant Women Services Ottawa's (IWSO) mandate is to empower immigrant, refugee and visible minority women and their families.
- Conseil Économique et Social d'Ottawa Carleton: The Conseil Économique et Social d'Ottawa Carleton (CESOC) promotes the accommodation of diversity among the French speaking population and in Francophone Institutions. Its mission is to support the economic and social development of black and other ethno-cultural French speaking minority communities and to foster a multicultural francophone environment in Ottawa.
- <u>Iewish Family Services</u>: The mission of Jewish Family Services (JFS) is to strengthen Jewish individual, family and community life in Ottawa by direct social intervention, partnership and advocacy. JFS also provides services for all immigrants and has specialized in services for immigrant seniors in recent years.
- Somali Centre for Family Services: Established in 1991, the Somali Centre for Family Services has been serving Ottawa's Somali community by offering settlement, employment, family, and youth services. Its mission is to help immigrants and refugees in need

through partnerships, services and programs. The organization has a particular specialization on the local Somali community.

- <u>Lebanese and Arab Social Services Agency</u>: The Lebanese and Arab Social Services Agency (LASSA) was established in 1989, and has a mission to provide quality services to support the settlement and integration of newcomers generally, and Arabic speaking immigrants in particular.
- Ottawa Chinese Community Service Centre: The Ottawa Chinese Community Service Centre aims to support the full social and economic integration and participation of newcomers, immigrants and people of Chinese descent in Ottawa. Examples of its programs include employment support services and services for Chinese seniors.
- Ottawa Community Immigrant Services Organization: Since 1978, the Ottawa Community Immigrant Services Organization (OCISO) has been providing programs and services for immigrants and refugees in Ottawa. OCISO's mission is to support immigrants in a holistic way as they establish their lives in Canada.
- Ottawa Public Library: The Ottawa Public Library offers a number of services to newcomers at branches across the city. The Library Settlement Partnership program involves partnerships with local settlement agencies to deliver settlement services to immigrants at library branches. Other services include language support and conversation circles, support for writing the Canadian Citizenship Test, job search support and financial literacy support.
- National Capital Region YMCA-YWCA: The National Capital YMCA-YWCA offers services to newcomers in three areas: (1) Language Assessment and Referral Centre; (2) Newcomer Information Centre; and (3) Job Connect. It also offers specific supports for internationally trained professionals through sector specific workshops.
- La Cité Collégiale:

La Cité Collégiale offers 'Cours de langue pour les immigrants au Canada' (CLIC) courses for immigrants wishing to settle in French, with free childminding services. They also offer language, employment and training support aimed at specific professions, such as construction, and advanced language training courses.

b. Algonquin College

Algonquin College offers LINC courses for immigrants wishing to settle in English, with free childminding. Algonquin College also hosted the Internationally Educated Professionals Conference in 2009 and 2010, in partnership with LASI World Skills and La Cité Collégiale.

This conference brings together internationally educated individuals with local employers. Algonquin College also has an Internationally Trained Newcomers program that supports newcomers to negotiate the Canadian requirements for employment in their fields and provides advice on academic and language upgrading requirements.

c. Internationally Trained Workers Partnership and Hire Immigrants Ottawa

The Internationally Trained Workers Partnership (ITWP) was established in 2002 to "develop a locally coordinated approach to integrate immigrants more effectively into Ottawa's labour market" (www.itwp.ca). One of ITWP's major projects is Hire Immigrants Ottawa (HIO), which has been working since 2006 to increase the capacity of employers to integrate immigrants into the workplace.

HIO engages employers from five sectors (Information Technology, Health, the Public Sector, Finance and Biotechnology) through working groups and an Employer Council of Champions. HIO does not provide direct immigrant services but partners with a number of the services organizations listed above to help facilitate immigrants' access to employment.

d. The Coalition of Community Health and Resource Centres

Although not specifically focused on immigrant services, Ottawa's network of community health and resource centres offer neighbourhood-based primary health care and community services that often provide support to immigrants. These

include housing assistance, assistance with employment, health promotion, multicultural programs, food security and services specifically for women, youth and seniors, in addition to healthcare services. There are fourteen Community Health and Resource Centres in Ottawa.

e. School Boards

Ottawa's four schools boards offer a variety of support services for immigrant families. For example, The Ottawa Carleton District School Board, the Ottawa Carleton Catholic School Board and the Conseil des écoles publiques de l'Est de l'Ontario offer LINC/CLIC courses to immigrants with a variety of language and literacy levels through Continuing Education. All four school boards offer ESL or FSL courses that may include childminding at some facilities.

The Ottawa Carleton District School Board and the Ottawa Carleton Catholic School Board both have family reception centres for newcomer families joining the school system. The Conseil des écoles publiques de l'Est de l'Ontario offers a "welcome class" to newcomer students between the ages of 12-17 to help them to adjust to the school system and to the French language.

III: Analysis and Recommendations

Analysis & Recommendations

The inventory of services and the interview data pointed to a number of strengths and challenges in the current services and service delivery models designed to support immigrants' integration in Ottawa. These can be identified for the three broad types of services covered by the OLIP-WCI Inventory.

In the broad category of settlement services (see Appendix A), a key strength is the collaboration and partnership that exists around the delivery of settlement services to immigrants in Ottawa. The LASI Coalition, described above, represents a loosely coordinated system of settlement programs that informs the ways in which settlement services are organized and delivered in Ottawa. The LASI Coalition, now composed of 12 member organizations, fosters specialization and enables local agencies to focus on types of specific primary services while offering some common services as well. According to interview respondents, the LASI framework helps to avoid duplication. One respondent states:

"Services may look similar but they are not. With [so many] immigrants coming to Ottawa each year... it is not possible to meet the demand. There is no overlap, LASI agencies specialize in delivering different programs but we continue to deliver some common programs at a low level to facilitate access for people living in different areas of the City."

In addition, through regular monthly meetings, and special topic-focused meetings, the LASI Coalition seeks to not only develop a shared understanding of existing and emerging community needs, but also tends to establish a common local agenda in tackling broad community challenges related to the accommodation of diversity, and prioritizing the needs of immigrants in Ottawa's civic plans and activities. One of the interviewees states:

"Executive directors meet once a month to identify community issues . . . agencies undertake community consultations with immigrants . . . executive directors participate on many committees so they gain broad knowledge of issues in the community."

The LASI Coalition also contributes to policy dialogue and knowledge generation. In addition to offering services to immigrants, settlement agencies play a number of key roles. For example, settlement agencies act as sites for the testing and evaluation of pilot projects and the refinement of best practices, generating opportunities for evidence-based planning, management and policy development. The collaborative structure of the LASI Coalition provides a venue for discussion and sharing of best practices that goes beyond an individual agency to a system of agencies serving a dynamic immigrant population. In addition, members of the LASI Coalition are frequently engaged with research and consultation initiatives that help to further inform program and policy development.

The LASI Coalition represents a positive model of collaboration between Ottawa settlement agencies. It is important to note that the member organizations of the LASI Coalition also collaborate, formally or informally, with numerous other important stakeholders. For example, collaborations between the LASI Coalition agencies exist with school boards, Community Health and Resource Centres, colleges and universities, the Ottawa Public Library, the Ottawa Police Service, the United Way/Centraide Ottawa, and others. These collaborations have been and continue to be essential for broadening community support for immigrant settlement and integration, and for ensuring that services are well coordinated, effective and complimentary across a variety of sectors.

An additional strength in the area of partnership and collaboration in Ottawa is the Coalition of Community Health and Resource Centres (CCHRC). The CCHRC's mission states: "The coalition is a network of community-based health and resource centres which recognizes the importance of responding to the diversity of needs within local communities and pays particular attention to those members of the community who are most vulnerable and at risk".

The CHRC Coalition "acts as a catalyst to:

- Develop the capacity of communities to address local issues;
- Advocate and facilitate social action; and
- Plan, design, coordinate and provide Francophone and Anglophone health and social services that contribute to healthy communities within Ottawa." (www.coalitionottawa.ca)

Although not focusing only on immigrants, it is obvious from the inventory that community health and resource centres play a vital role in offering a variety of programs and services to immigrants in Ottawa – both new immigrants and foreignborn citizens who have long settled into Ottawa's neighbourhoods. Like the LASI Coalition, the CCHRC demonstrates a model of collaboration that promotes a coordinated and cooperative effort for effective service delivery to the communities.

Another key strength emerging from the inventory and interviews in the area of settlement is the role played by community agencies in the areas of Public Awareness and Community Capacity Building. This goes beyond the delivery of direct services to promote positive change and to develop Ottawa's capacity as a welcoming community. When reviewing the category on Public Awareness and Community Capacity (see Appendix A), it is evident that every settlement agency engages in community projects, public awareness campaigns, and/or special programs that promote healthy and welcoming communities. For example, Jewish Family Services offers a program entitled Against Prejudice, which works with immigrants and Canadian-born individuals to address biases and prejudice.

Another example of community capacity building comes from the South East Ottawa Community Health Centre, which launched No Community Left Behind, a social development initiative to promote safe communities and the social determinants of health. Although it does not have a specific focus on immigrants, it is relevant in that it takes a holistic and inclusive approach to healthy community building. Numerous other examples of Public Awareness and Community Capacity Building work are provided in Appendix A.

A number of strengths exist in the area language services. Primarily, the YMCA-YWCA Language Assessment Resource Centre (LARC), which functions as a centralized assessment and referral centre that refers immigrants to LINC/CLIC classes according to the Canadian Language Benchmarks. LARC staff may also council clients to access other settlement or social services based on their needs. This model of central assessment and referral is effective in that immigrants are able to access a one-stop location for referral to language services, facilitating their navigation of and access to a system of services that might otherwise be confusing.

Another strength in the area of language services is the Enhanced Language Training and Occupation Specific language classes available to immigrants seeking employment in various professions. Offered by LASI World Skills, the Ottawa Chinese Community Services Centre, Algonquin College and La Cité Collégiale, these classes combine language skills training with workplace readiness training. These types of integrated programs are important and must be scaled up to meet the needs of immigrants in more fields and with different levels of language ability.

Settlement services with a language component represent another strength in the language sector, as they take an integrated approach that provides immigrants with both support for social integration and making connections and language acquisition. Examples of success in this area are the English and French conversation circles offered by a number of settlement agencies in collaboration with the Ottawa Public Library. These programs offer immigrants a chance to practice languages in a social setting and to become familiar with libraries as welcoming public spaces.

As is evident, employment services for immigrants in Ottawa are quite extensive (see Appendix C). In the settlement sector, LASI World Skills represents best practice in this area, as it specializes in services to support immigrants seeking employment. LASI World Skills offers a range of services including Job Search Workshops, occupation-specific support and bridging programs, and Enhanced Language Training for Professionals. The agency also collaborates with employers to match immigrants looking for work and to develop tools to support them to hire immigrants. A key strength of LASI World Skills is its collaboration with other organizations, including colleges and settlement sector agencies.

Another strength in the employment area is the work of the colleges to support immigrant employment integration. A number of programs exist to support the general population and immigrants to prepare for employment in a broad range of professions, including health care and the trades. Additionally, colleges offer employment readiness programs with a literacy and job skills component and college readiness programs to support the transition to college courses. This range of programming is important to meet the needs of immigrants seeking jobs in high demand fields.

Service Gaps and Challenges 3.2

Despite the above-mentioned strengths in the delivery of services to immigrants in Ottawa, a number of gaps and challenges can be identified. Respondents in interviews with key actors from the settlement sector in Ottawa identified several challenges related to program design and delivery in the settlement sector. Many of these challenges relate to the way services are funded. The duration of funding poses a challenge for the sustainability of programs and services. This challenge has consistently emerged in a number of research and consultation activities regarding Ottawa's settlement sector and poses a serious challenge to the delivery of consistent services to immigrants and in retaining knowledgeable and experienced settlement staff. One respondent stated:

"Many of the projects delivered ... are pilot, short-term projects. The agency faces the constant challenge of finding multiple sources of funding in order to responsively deliver services . . . The agency's holistic activities are created and managed under heavy constraints."

Despite the benefits of the collaborative model of the LASI Coalition, described above, respondents also expressed concerns about the environment of competition for funding and its impact on service delivery. This relates in particular to concerns involving "new players" competing for existing funds in a changing environment. Previously, the settlement agencies making up the LASI Coalition had been the primary actors responsible for delivering settlement and integration services to immigrants. This has changed, with more "mainstream" service providers offering these services and thus competing for funds to support immigrant services. Despite the potential benefits that come from expanded services for immigrants, this has created a feeling of insecurity within the settlement sector. One respondent, in reference to a past increase in funding for settlement and integration, states:

"The increased funding did not only bring new opportunities for us, it also brought in new players who got the new opportunity to address immigrants' settlement needs through their work – such as for example, public institutions, municipalities ... and many other stakeholders. This has brought the sector benefits, and strengths, but also a lot of fear especially because public institutions which are much larger are usually seen by government funders as being more credible and safer to invest in. They are also seen as

having more resources as the enablers for doing some of the things we may want to do but cannot. The new fear is that they will define the sector."

Despite the spirit of collaboration described above, this environment of competition is detrimental to the cohesiveness within the community of service providers.

An additional challenge to the delivery of services to immigrants in Ottawa, which was also identified by interview respondents, is eligibility criteria. As is demonstrated in the inventory tables (see Appendices A, B and C), eligibility for services varies. This is largely determined by who is funding the program, and may exclude people in need from accessing the service. In particular, there are gaps in services for several categories of immigrants who may require settlement, language and employment services regardless of their immigrant status. This includes: immigrants who have become Canadian citizens, temporary workers, refugee claimants, and international students. A number of interview respondents raised the question of eligibility when discussing issues related to service delivery and accessibility:

"Eligibility criteria prevent many people from accessing services which they need in order to settle."

"Temporary workers and students are also excluded from accessing . . . services although they live here, work and contribute to the community."

"Eligibility criteria are very restrictive. In the long run, it does not benefit anyone."

Interview respondents argue that eligibility criteria that exclude many immigrants in need of settlement support are contradictory to the goal of integration and welcoming communities. It is notable that this challenge has emerged from a number of other OLIP research activities and consultations.

In addition to challenges related to program design and delivery, a number of gaps in services can be identified. While several organizations offer youth services, these services are not sufficient to meet the significant needs of immigrant youth. In addition, there is a need for enhanced services to meet the needs of other high-need immigrant sub-groups, such as seniors, women, men experiencing mental health challenges and changing family roles, persons with disabilities, and LGBTQ

immigrants. Services for Francophone immigrants are also limited, despite the good work of organizations such as le Conseil Économique et Social d'Ottawa-Carleton (CESOC) and La Cité Collegiale. While many agencies offer services in English and French, there is a shortage of services designed for and offered to Francophones specifically.

In the area of language services, a significant gap relates specifically to a unique characteristic of Ottawa. As the capital of Canada and because of its proximity to Quebec, Ottawa is and is seen to be a bilingual city. This means that many employers require staff to be proficient in both English and French, a factor that can determine an individual's success in obtaining employment regardless of credentials or qualifications. Despite this, immigrants are not supported to settle and integrate as bilingual new residents. Current services allow new immigrants to be settled only in one of Canada's official languages. This restriction tends to affect Francophone immigrants more negatively, given that Ottawa's labour market is predominantly Anglophone. There is a need for immigrants to access both English and French language training in order to not be further disadvantaged when competing for jobs in the labour market. This access must include access to Enhanced Language Training and Occupation Specific programs in both official languages.

An additional gap in language services in Ottawa relates to services for immigrants with special needs. While there is one program in place (English Language Tutoring for the Ottawa Community), it has limited capacity due to resource scarcity and only serves immigrants in English. Programs such as this should be scaled up to meet the needs of immigrants who are unable to access classroom-based programs, such as single parents with young children, seniors and people with disabilities.

Additionally, as discussed above, eligibility criteria may exclude immigrants in need from accessing language training programs such as LINC/CLIC and ESL/FSL, depending on the organization offering the service.

In the area of employment, it is evident that a broad range of services is available for immigrants. Despite this fact, immigrants continue to struggle in the area of employment. The majority of employment services are aimed at immigrants and there continues to be a shortage of programs working with employers and the general public to understand and mitigate barriers impeding immigrants' access to employment.

It is notable that organizations such as Hire Immigrant Ottawa and LASI World Skills work with employers, but it is clear that there is a need for more work to be done in this area. For example, a significant barrier to employment cited by many immigrants is lack of "Canadian experience". While in some cases local experience may be required to do a job successfully, "Canadian experience" is more often a sign of a lack of understanding on the part of the employer about the assets that immigrants bring. This demonstrates a need for increased collaboration with employers and increased awareness raising among the general public.

There is also a gap in bridging and on-the-job training programs for immigrants in a variety of fields. These programs provide immigrants with practical experience in a Canadian context, and offer a first step in creating the necessary networks needed for obtaining full-time employment. While bridging programs exist for immigrants in specific skilled professions such as the Medical License Bridging Program, there is a need for expanded on-the-job opportunities for immigrants.

An additional gap in the employment area is support for immigrant youth. While there are a number of employment programs for youth that may be accessed by immigrants, there is a need for increased employment services with a specific focus on immigrant youth and their needs.

3.3 Recommendations

Based on the above discussion of strengths and gaps in services for immigrants in Ottawa in the areas of general settlement, language and employment services, a number of recommendations can be made.

a. Resource a coordinating function for an expanded coalition of Settlement Service Providers

Primarily, it is evident that collaboration and coordination, although not always easy to achieve, can lead to an improved system of services for immigrants in Ottawa due to coordinated planning of services, expanded specialization and knowledge sharing regarding emerging needs. The LASI Coalition has demonstrated good practice in this area, and has collaborated formally and informally with stakeholders both within the settlement sector and from other sectors. With the advent of new providers in the settlement sector, the LASI Coalition has recently expanded. There is a need to support

a common planning function within the settlement sector that promotes trust among this growing partnership.

b. Coordinate and Expand Support Services for Immigrant Youth

There are a number of successful programs for youth that are offered by a variety of sectors, including OCISO's immigrant youth program (YOCISO), Pathways to Education and the Catholic Immigration Centre's Youth Centre. Yet, effective supports for immigrant youth remain a critical gap in Ottawa. Immigrant youth are a high-need population in Ottawa and these programs must be scaled up in order to better meet needs. In addition, new programs focused on immigrant youth, such as programs supporting employment, must be established to properly support youth in their transition to employment. Similarly, increased services specifically targeting immigrant sub-groups that have been identified as underserved and high-need must be put in place to ensure that all immigrants are supported in the process of settlement and integration.

c. Pool resources from multiple funders (including multiple levels of government and private funders) to tackle the exclusion, due to strict eligibility criteria, of immigrants in need of key settlement, language, and employment services

Related to the above recommendation is the reality that eligibility requirements often prohibit immigrants in need from accessing services that will improve their lives. Steps to mitigate the exclusion of specific groups, such as coordination between funders and frequent needs analyses of numerous immigrant sub-groups, are strongly recommended.

d. Allow immigrants in Ottawa to settle in both English & French so as to promote Ottawa's bilingualism and enable immigrants to be competitive in Ottawa's labour market

In the area of language services, there is a significant need for increased support for immigrants to settle and integrate in Ottawa as bilingual residents. This is essential for their employment and economic integration, and will also significantly support their social integration. An increase in accessible programs that support immigrants to learn both English and French and that promote the value of bilingualism is recommended.

e. Integrate complementary programs as a measure of increasing the accessibility of programs

There is also a need to integrate more programs that are complementary and allow for multiple interventions and impacts. Current successful combinations of programs exist and have shown good results. These include settlement services that contain a language component (such as conversation circles) and language programs that contain an employment-readiness component (such as Enhanced Language Training for Newcomers.) There is a need to scale up these existing programs and to expand them for more impact. For example, Enhanced Language Training and Occupation Specific language programs should be made available to immigrants looking for work in more fields.

f. More language programs are needed for low skill, low literacy immigrants.

Language acquisition is an essential component of immigrant settlement and integration. Just as there is a need to increase settlement services for immigrant sub-groups, there is a need to increase access to language services by high-need and underserved immigrants and by those immigrants who may be excluded due to current eligibility requirements, such as seniors, mothers with small children, immigrants with disabilities, etc.

g. More bridging programs, especially for professions in sectors experiencing skills shortages

Despite the large number of employment programs for immigrants there is a need for increased bridging and on-the-job training programs to allow immigrants to gain practical experience in a local workplace and to develop professional networks and references.

As part of this recommendation there is a need for local labour market analyses to identify industries that are already experiencing shortages and those that will experience shortages in the next 5, 10, and 20 years.

h. More tools and training are needed to help employers understand the assets immigrants bring and to help them overcome perceptions of risk

There is a need for increased collaboration with employers and for communication with the general public to build an environment where immigrants are valued for their skills and assets.

Conclusion

The OLIP-WCI Inventory demonstrates that Ottawa has a rich and complex system of Settlement, Language, and Employment services, provided by a broad range of diverse organizations in multiple sectors.

The service providers we interviewed are knowledgeable about the needs of immigrants and have provided nuanced descriptions of the challenges the Ottawa community will need to tackle in the new Strategy that will emerge from the OLIP process. There are many good practices on which Ottawa can build. A significant level of collaboration already exists within the settlement sector in Ottawa, and between the sector and other stakeholders. There is also significant opportunity for increased collaboration and coordination around immigrant service delivery.

Finally, despite the considerable Ottawa successes, there remains a need for enhanced services for immigrants in several areas, including services to immigrant sub-groups, services to support bilingual settlement, and services to support acquisition of job specific language and on-the-job experience. In the area of service delivery the often short-term and precarious nature of funding creates challenges for the settlement sector, and eligibility requirements often lead to exclusion of immigrants in need of services. These findings are consistent with what came out of a number of other research and consultation activities conducted by OLIP.

In closing, we would like to stress that this inventory is a baseline snapshot - a foundation on which the Ottawa stakeholders will keep building - both because the current mix of services will necessarily evolve, but also because we make no claim of being exhaustive. Furthermore, the inventory covered only three types of services: Settlement, Language, and Employment. There is a need to do similar inventories for housing supports, for health, and for other services that are critical to the settlement and integration of immigrants.

IV: Introduction to Inventory Tables

The data collected for the Inventory of Services for Immigrants in Ottawa is presented in Appendices A (Settlement and Integration Services), B (Language Services) and C (Employment Related Services). The data are presented in tables, which are divided into sub-categories. Each section is divided according to sub-category of service (i.e. services for youth, services for Francophones, etc.), and then further divided by category of service provider (i.e. settlement service providers, government agencies etc.).

For each service listed, the following information is provided:

- The program name and the name, location, and contact information of the agency providing the service;
- Where relevant, the names of partner organizations;
- A brief description of the service;
- The target population for the service and, if applicable, eligibility criteria.

The Settlement and Integration Services section captures a broad range of services and programs provided by numerous organizations in order to support the settlement and integration of immigrants. Found in Appendix A, the Settlement and Integration Services section is divided according to the following sub-categories:

- Education and School Support Services: These services are specifically offered to support immigrant students and their families to integrate into the school system and are focused on primary and secondary school.
- Public Awareness and Community Capacity Building: This sub-category captures the work of a number of agencies to: a) raise awareness among the general public about the importance of immigrants and immigrant integration, b) to raise awareness among immigrant communities about a number of relevant issues (i.e. health promotion, family violence, etc.), and c) to empower communities by promoting civic engagement and positive approaches to community building.
- Services for Refugees: This sub-category includes reception and support services and settlement and integration services specifically designed to meet the unique needs of refugees.

- Services for Families: The services listed in this sub-category take a family-based approach to supporting immigrants to settle, integrate, and deal with challenges they may encounter throughout the process.
- Gender Focused Services: This sub-category outlines gender-based services for immigrants, in particular for immigrant women.
- Services for Youth: This sub-category includes services that meet the specific and complex needs of immigrant youth.

In Appendix B, the Language Services section outlines services that support immigrant settlement and integration specifically by helping immigrants to build their capacity in Canada's two official languages. The services in this section are divided into the following sub-categories:

- Language Assessment Centres: This sub-category lists services that provide immigrants with assessments of their language needs and with referrals to appropriate language courses.
- Language Instruction for Newcomers to Canada/Cours de langue pour immigrants au Canada: This section lists agencies offering LINC/CLIC courses in the Ottawa area.
- English as a Second Language/ French as a Second Language: This section lists ESL and FSL programs available in the Ottawa area.
- Enhanced Language Training and Occupation-Specific Language Training: This subcategory lists language programs that are specifically designed to provide language training with a workplace readiness component.
- Settlement Services with a Language Component: This sub-category lists services that are offered for the primary purpose of promoting settlement and integration, but which also provide support for the development of language skills.
- English Conversation Circles: The services listed in this sub-section allow immigrants to practice English in a semi-formal group setting.
- French Conversation Circles: The services listed in this sub-section allow immigrants to practice French in a semi-formal group setting.
- Interpretation and Translation Services: This sub-section list services that provide translation and/or interpretation, including cultural interpretation.

Finding employment, particularly employment that is appropriate to one's skills, training and experience, is a major concern for many of Ottawa's immigrants. Appendix C outlines employment services offered in Ottawa. While many of the services listed are specifically designed for immigrants, others are open to the general public. Appendix C is divided into the following sub-categories:

- Settlement Agencies Offering Employment Services: This sub-section lists a number of employment services offered by the settlement sector and specifically designed to support immigrants seeking employment.
- Community Colleges and Universities Offering Newcomer Employment Services: This sub-section lists employment programs, specifically designed for immigrants, that are offered by Ottawa's colleges and universities.
- Mainstream Organizations Offering Newcomer-Related Employment Services: Outlined in this sub-section are employment services, specifically designed for immigrants, that are offered by "mainstream", or non-settlement sector, organizations.
- Employment Assessment Centres: This sub-section outlines services, available to the general public, that provide assessments and referrals for individuals seeking employment. Although these are not specifically targeted to immigrants they are of relevance to immigrants seeking employment.
- Employment Services for Francophone Newcomers: This sub-section lists employment services that are offered in French to Francophone newcomers.
- Programs and Services for Persons with Disabilities: Listed in this sub-section are employment support services specifically targeted to people with disabilities. While not targeted specifically to immigrants they may be relevant to immigrants with disabilities seeking employment.
- Programs and Services for Francophone Persons with Disabilities: Listed in this subsection are employment support services specifically targeted to Francophones with disabilities. While not targeted specifically to immigrants they may be relevant to Francophone immigrants with disabilities seeking employment.
- Professional Mentorships: The services listed in this section offer opportunities for immigrants to be mentored by established professionals.
- Regulated Professions and Trades: This section provides information on support available to individuals, including immigrants, wishing to work in regulated professions or trades.

- Government Services: This sub-section includes a list of employment services offered by government agencies.
- Self Employment and Entrepreneurship: Listed in this section are programs that support both immigrants and members of the general public wishing to become entrepreneurs.
- Youth Employment Services: This section lists employment services for youth, including immigrant youth, in Ottawa.
- Employment Services for Youth at Risk: This section lists employment services for youth that are specifically targeted at youth who are at risk.
- Employment and Training for Youth with Disabilities: The services in this subsection provide support to youth, including immigrant youth, with disabilities to allow them to obtain training and find employment.
- Strategic Approaches to Immigrant Employment: This section lists initiatives that support the Ottawa community, including employers, to hire immigrants.

As mentioned above, this inventory, while very comprehensive, is not intended to be exhaustive. OLIP also recognizes that the landscape of services in Ottawa is often changing, and it is our intention to frequently update and expand upon this inventory.

- Be currently recognized as having full-time student status in the academic institution in which you are presently enrolled;
- Be returning to fulltime studies for your next academic term; and
- Be at least the minimum age to work in the province or territory where the job exists.
